Most antisocial behaviour cases are dealt with through early intervention, taking simple actions to help resolve issues before they escalate. Speak to the police or council for advice

What is ASB?

Definition of Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB):
Actions that cause harassment, alarm, or distress to others

Examples of ASB include:

- Excessive noise
- Vandalism
- Intimidation
- Public drunkenness
- Drug misuse
- Groups causing disruption in public spaces

Impact of ASB:

- Affects individuals, families, and entire communities
- Can make people feel unsafe in their homes or neighbourhoods

Key message:

Even behaviour that seems minor can have a significant impact if it is persistent or targeted

Get help

If antisocial behaviour (ASB) is affecting your quality of life, or making you fear for your safety or the safety of others, there are people who can help

What can you do?

If you experience or witness ASB, it's important to report it

How to report it

Non-emergency:

- Contact your local council
- Call the police on **101** (UK non-emergency number)
- Report online northants.police.uk/ro

In an emergency:

- Call **999** if someone is in immediate danger or a crime is in progress

Recording incidents:

Keep a record of dates, times, and details. This helps authorities take appropriate action

Reporting options:

- You can report concerns anonymously
- Your information will be handled sensitively
- Providing contact details can help agencies follow up, but is not always required

Key message:

- You don't have to tolerate anti-social behaviour
- Reporting helps agencies respond and keep your community safe

What happens next?

When you have reported

After a report is made, the local council, housing provider or police will assess the situation

Possible actions taken:

- Issuing warnings
- Mediation between parties
- Providing support for victims
- Taking enforcement action where necessary

Joint working:

Agencies may work together to address ongoing or persistent issues
